- **Established in 1956/57** through the personal initiative of professors at JGU and in the States
- Program Objectives:
 - Deepen expertise in American Studies and experience the literature, language and cultures of North America
 - Enhance professional skills and use your cultural insights and language skills for your future career
 - Serve as a cultural ambassador by representing JGU abroad
 - Experience North American life firsthand
 - Enjoy unforgettable moments that contribute to both personal and academic growth







General Information: What does the Direct Exchange Offer?

- Unique Opportunity to study in North America
- Competitive advantage due to a relatively limited number of applicants
- Guided application process
- Financial support (differs for every partnering university):
 - Full scholarships
 - Partial scholarships in combination with a teaching assistantship or research assistantship
 - Partial scholarships (no tuition fee) additional expenses can be covered by DAAD, Auslands-BAFöG, Fulbright, savings etc.







General Information: How do your Studies Benefit from this Exchange?

- Academic Advancement: Earn credits toward your study program at JGU (consult with student counselors prior to stay abroad)
- Language proficiency and fluency
- Cultural knowledge
- Career Boost: Improved prospects at job market through international experience
- Personal growth
- Option to take a leave of absence ("Beurlaubung") to stay within your program's "Regelstudienzeit"








The Application Process: Overview



Requesting an Academic Record

Where to request an academic record?


- <u>BEds/MEds/Kernfach not within DEL:</u> Please request it directly at your respective Prüfungsbüro; provide your full name, email address (use your university's account!), matriculation number, and subject combination. Academic record needs to be in English.
- BAs/MAs (Kernfach DEL): Please fill out the provided list; your Direct Exchange counselors will then request the academic record for you

Once you have received your academic record:

- The academic record will be sent to you on JOGU-StINe (this may take a few days or longer!)
- Please forward it to us along with your first application draft

(Uniwechsler: Please get your academic record from your previous university...)





How Does the Selection Process Work?

- The candidate will be selected by the American (or Canadian)
 College/University unless stated otherwise
- The response can be expected between March and April
- Answers will either be given through us or the college/university directly
- We will inform every applicant as soon as we receive an answer Please let us know if you receive a confirmation by the respective university/college directly!







Terms & Conditions of Submitting Your Application

 By submitting your application, you confirm to accept the scholarship should you be selected by the partnering university/college!

You are responsible to meet all visa requirements/ requirements
 posted by the host institution – make sure to be up to date on all rules,
 requirements, and deadlines!








- Some universities require a TOEFL-Test (Test of English as a Foreign Language). Further information on the test can be found here http://www.ets.org/toefl.

- Given that most students will have to pay for their travel expenses (not all universities will cover these expenses), we **strongly recommend to** all applicants, to apply for a Fulbright travel stipend as well (the deadline is usually January 15).




Washington College, Chestertown, MD

Application via **Prof. Scheiding**

- Teaching assistantship at the German Department
 - 3 classes, max. 10 hours a week
 - Social activities of the German Club
- Scholarship for 2 semesters
 - Tuition waver for 2 classes per semester
 - Free housing
 - Stipend of ca. \$2.400 per year (monthly payrate)
- Extra costs: visa, health insurance and health fee, costs for introductory week and deposit (ca. \$550), book fees, meal plan
- TOEFL is needed if your application was successful












- Scholarship: 2 classes per semester □ full stipend
- Flights are covered, free housing in the "Deutsches Haus",
 free dining in the cafeterias, student health insurance
- You will have to pay for your visa
- Middlebury interviews via Zoom









University of Kansas, Lawrence, KS

Application via **Prof. Scheiding**



- A completed Bachelor's degree by the time of departure is mandatory, as well as a graded graduate studies seminar incl. a term paper
- TOEFL is required
- A full tuition and course fee waiver of up to 12 credits, a living stipend of \$3,750
 USD per semester term (\$7,500 for a full academic year)
 - the stipend may take up to two months into your stay to be issued
- Students are responsible for Campus fee \$492, KUID card \$21, Orientation fee \$240, ISS Checkin Fee \$35, International Student fee \$170 and required Health insurance (@\$1,026)





Hood College, Frederick, MD

 Teaching assistantship in German (2x 50mincoursesperweek) and 3x weekly observation in other courses with correction work (approx. \$3500 for 8 months; paid biweekly) and a conversation course

 Scholarship (worth ca. \$20.000) for 12 credits = 2 classes per semester

Rent-free housing in the "Deutsches Haus" (organizing cultural activities)

· Freemeals at the cafeteria

You will have to pay for insurance, flights, visa, and books

TOEFL, Duolingo and IELTS is accepted as English language tests

University of Louisville, KY

Application via **Prof. Banerjee**



- Tuition waiver covering for 1-2 semesters (sponsored by Sister Cities
- Option for a second person to go through "Study @ the Ville" program.
 (\$5,000 "scholarship" > \$9,868 per semester)
- You will have to cover for housing, food and health insurance
- Additional costs (ca \$250)
- TOEFL or Duolingo is mandatory





Bowdoin College, Brunswick, ME

Application via **Prof. Banerjee**



- Focus on teaching German
- Tuition and housing covered by Bowdoin, comes with a part-time instructorship (up to 15 hrs/semester, conversation courses and/or "language crash courses"; single or group teaching) in German (teaching and related activities; mentoring the German Table)
- monthly pay of ca. US\$ 600
- tution fee waiver for 2 classes per semester, free housing and food, as well as health insurance
- You only need to pay for your visa





Clark University, Worcester, MA

Application via **Prof. Banerjee**



American Antiquarian Society

- Only for MA- Students who have completed at least 2 "Hauptseminare"
- Can be financed through: e.g. an additional stipend, etc., if not tuition fee: 20% of the regular tuition fee (approx. USD 35.000 per year = approx. \$7000)
- University's health insurance is mandatory (USD 1.650 per year)
- Up to 4 classes per semester

Binational Degree an der Clark University is possible (Binational MA)

TOEFL is mandatory





York University, Toronto, Ontario




Application via **Prof. Banerjee**

- Tuition waiver for three classes per semester
- Only for students that are at the end of their studies (GPA at 2,5 and above)
- University's health insurance is mandatory (approx. CAD 264/term)
- You need to pay for housing and food
- Additional costs may apply (books, trips, etc.)
- Confirmation letter of English proficiency, TOEFL or IELTS results
- Graduate students must not enroll in no more than three courses per semester
